SPOTLIGHT NEWS

Friends of Music interviews Dr. Timothy Solinger, 5th Grade Band Teacher at Craig & 6th Grade Band and Lessons Teacher at Iroquois & Van Antwerp Middle Schools



Where did you grow up?

I was born in Mount Vernon, NY, but when I was around a year old, my parents moved to a small town in the Poughkeepsie area called Poughquag.

How were you involved in music growing up?

My earliest musical memories involve messing around on my Dad's drum set, singing along to The Beatles on road trips, and being completely enamored with John William's scores to Star Wars, Indiana Jones, and Hook. I started playing the trombone in the school band in 4th grade, but in 7th grade I tried to convince my parents to let me quit; luckily, they were having none of that! By the time I got to high school I was completely hooked, participating in band, symphony orchestra, marching band, choir, drama club, brass quintet, jazz

ensembles, rock bands, the local youth symphony, and any other type of group I could find.

Where did you go to college?

I completed my Bachelors at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, NY, my Masters at the University of Akron in Ohio, and my Doctoral studies at SUNY Stony Brook on Long Island.

Do you have any favorite extracurricular activities that you want to share?

I played tennis and was involved with competitive swimming until about sophomore year of high school. I was never a particularly gifted athlete, but I enjoyed the competition, challenge, and sense of accomplishment that came with these sports.

What are your current responsibilities with Niskayuna?

I currently teach the 6th grade band, as well as 6th grade lessons at our two middle schools. I'm also responsible for the 5th grade band program at Craig Elementary.

What are your goals?

It's really important to me that the students feel seen, heard, safe, and challenged, and that every student is able to see themselves reflected in our band program. I want the kids to feel a sense of community and accomplishment and for them to understand that music is both a means of expression and a tool for getting through difficult times. As a new teacher in the district, I am also very focused on learning as much as I can about this wonderful community and getting to know my outstanding colleagues and students.

What are your favorite things to do outside of school?

History is really fascinating to me, and a great deal of what I read and watch is related to this subject; I'm particularly interested in 19th century US and 20th century world history. When I'm not playing/listening to music or reading, you can find me fishing, hiking, hanging out with our cats, or spending time with family and friends.

Do you have any advice to students studying music now?

I would tell them that the idea of talent is an incredibly overrated concept- there are no shortcuts to excellence in any field, including music. The very best athletes, musicians, artists, etc., all got to where they are because they were persistent! You can become an expert on anything you set your mind to, but only if you are willing to put in the time and effort.

Do you have any advice to students who want to pursue music as their career?

I would encourage those students to become the best overall musician they can be- take all the music classes you can and expose yourself to a wide variety of styles and genres. I would also encourage those students to become really great at a couple different things. Because music can be such a competitive field, I think it's really important to have two excellent skill sets that you can offer, whether that's playing and teaching, teaching and arranging, composing and producing, etc. In most cases, being really great at a couple different things is going to be extremely helpful in establishing yourself and building a career in this challenging but rewarding field.

Both students received a full scholarship to this event held in Ontario, Canada where they participated in and attended rehearsals, concerts, masterclasses, and coaching.

When asked about this experience, **Mathena** said, "I learned so much, too. I was kind of going into the festival a bit arrogant thinking that I knew a lot about singing and everything they're going to teach you've already taught me. But I was blown away by the guest speakers and professors... The concerts were amazing! Probably the best choral concert I've ever seen was by the Canadian Chamber Choir. They

were about the size of Bel, and they had the most beautiful blend. I cried at least twice during that concert. They had a very prevalent theme of indigenous rights, especially access to water. They partnered with a composer from the Cree people in Northern Canada. She worked with us on finding and respecting our voice as well as indigenous people's land. There was a huge emphasis on land acknowledgement and the importance of learning about other cultures and how they make music. I also loved the Camerata Coral de Puerto Rico. They were so fun to watch! They had so much expression and were moving. You could just tell they all loved to sing... There were so many incredible musicians I got to sing with... It was so fulfilling to sing with other hardworking singers from all over the US and Canada. I will always remember this experience, and the music. We got to keep it, so I will be looking back on it often. Thank you so much for the incredible recommendation that enabled me to have this incredible experience!"

Sophie Spindler on her experience:

This past July, I had the privilege of participating in the Pro Musica International Choral Festival at Queens University in Kingston, Ontario. Surrounded by 150 international vocalists, the environment radiated with excitement, love, and a willingness to learn.

Each day, we began rehearsal with a land acknowledgement. It was important to recognize that the land we were singing on did not belong to us. One of the most impactful experiences of the festival was working with Sheryl Sewepegaham, a singer, composer, and an educator of Cree-Dene ancestry. Adhering to tradition, we learned her songs by rote. Her voice filled the entire room, and she taught us the vocal technique to copy her unique sound. I appreciated how generous Sheryl was for sharing her culture with us. Each and every one of the vocalists was actively engaged. It proved to me that we are capable of learning about, respecting, and incorporating the long-silenced stories of Indigenous communities into our world.

In addition to rehearsals, we attended workshops with topics ranging from a vocal anatomy lesson to dancing to Michael Jackson. We learned that as vocalists, our whole body is our instrument. We learned not only how to produce different sounds, but the anatomical reasoning behind our training. I also had the opportunity to take a vocal lesson with Professor Elizabeth Eschen. A 30-minute lesson left me with a multitude of new vocal exercises to add to my warmups.

The choral ensembles featured in the festival were captivating. The Canadian Chamber Choir performed a concert titled "Where Waters Meet" with repertoire based on the beauty of water. Our local Albany Pro Musica collaborated with Camerata Coral de Puerto Rico in their beautiful concert titled "I Dream a World." The festival's initiative to use music as an agent of social change was a very prominent message, and it inspired us as young musicians to carry it with us on our musical journeys.

I would most definitely recommend students to apply for the festival. From harmonizing in the stairwells to celebrating each other at the student showcase, the bonds I formed with my peers through music carry immense value. The passion, intelligence, and dedication in the rehearsal hall proved to me that music is powerful. As Dr. Rollo Dilworth, the composer and conductor of our final piece, stated, "we can be the change for the world."

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
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
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
