## FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

#### Welcome to Music In Our Schools Month!

The music department and Friends of Music have been working hard to find ways to celebrate and we hope our community will take advantage of some special events. Throughout this edition of NOTES, you will find information about guest lecturers at the high school, streaming events online and some information for students looking to begin instruments in elementary school. Live performances are still on hold but if new opportunities become possible, we'll work with the district to offer as many chances as we can to help students create music together.

## **NYSSMA Update:**

Over 50 students across the district participated in the Piano festival. They uploaded auditions and received comments and scores in late February.

75 students in the middle schools and high school registered for the Solo/Ensemble festival and will send in their videos this month for adjudication.

Congratulations to all of our participants – it took some extra work this year and we are so proud of you!

The All-State Festival is being presented in March and teachers across the state had the chance to offer their applause to students. You can find a video <a href="here">here</a> from the high school faculty and Mrs. Koste for some much-needed cheer!

## **Spring Recruitment**

With all of the necessary safety precautions in place, we are developing a plan to meet current fourth and fifth graders so they can learn about the orchestra and band programs in June. Choosing an instrument to start playing in the fall will be an exciting way to end the school year and we look forward to welcoming new students. Look for information after the spring recess.

Since we were unable to recruit students last year, we will start two years of beginners in the fall – rising fifth and sixth graders. We hope that current third graders, who normally would have had the chance to choose an orchestra instrument this year, will be able to join in the winter of 2022. That decision will be made in the new school year, given the circumstances at that time.



Hannah Staudinger is an oboist and educator based in Boston and Upstate NY who performs regularly with ensembles in the Boston area, most notably the Boston Civic Symphony. An active recitalist, Hannah has performed solo programs from Boston and Baltimore, and her chamber collaborations include performances with the Weston Wind Quintet and the Kammerwerke Double Wind Quintet. Hannah has studied as well with John Ferrillo, Eugene Izotov, and Michael Lisicky. This summer Hannah will be performing at the National Music Festival, studying with Jared Hauser.

Beyond performance, Hannah's research is centered in developing pedagogical strategies and mechanical advancements in order to make double reed instruments accessible to public school and underserved students across grade levels. With her research, Hannah seeks to empower teachers to teach double reed instruments and provide resources that would allow for easier and more successful instruction, impacting the lives of students across the country.

Hannah holds a Master's in Oboe Performance from Boston University, and Bachelor's degrees in Oboe Performance and Music Education from the Peabody Institute of the Johns Hopkins University. She strives to combine her love of musical excellence and education through outreach initiatives. Currently, Hannah is a Doctoral Candidate at Boston University studying with Mark McEwen.

## Friends of Music interviews Marilyn Brown, General Music and Music Concepts Teacher at the Middle Schools and Applied Music Teacher at the High School & District Accompanist

## Where did you grow up?

I grew up right here, in Niskayuna. I attended Rosendale ES, Iroquois MS and NHS. My kids also attend school here. My daughter, Caitlyn is a sophomore at the high school and my son, Alex is in 7th grade at Van Antwerp MS.

## How were you involved in music growing up?

My dad is very musical and I picked it up from him at a young age. I started piano lessons when I was 8. I participated in many ensembles over the years, including Choir, Jazz Band (piano) and Symphonic Band (Mallet Percussion). I also accompanied the high school choir a bit and am proud to say my senior year I participated in "Bel Canto Voices" in its first year. That same year, I also played a piano concerto with the high school orchestra. Outside of school, I was involved in music ministry at my church, Suburban Council, and travelled Europe with American Music Abroad. I was the recipient of the Niskayuna Friends of Music scholarship when I graduated high school.

## Where did you go to college?

I got my Bachelor of Music in Education from Crane School of Music at SUNY Potsdam, and Master of Education in Educational Administration from UMASS Lowell.

## What are your current responsibilities with Niskayuna?

I currently teach General Music and Music Concepts at both middle schools and Applied Music at the High School. I am also the district accompanist.

#### Do you have any favorite extracurricular activities that you want to share?

I've recently taken up crocheting. I enjoy playing at open mic events, especially with my dad. And believe it or not, I still practice piano. I'm currently working on Chopin's Polonaise Op. 53.

#### What are your goals?

To plant some roots and see them grow. While I always want to improve as a teacher, right now, I want to enjoy watching my kids, and my students learn and grow in music and as people. For me, there is nothing better than to watch young people grow into wonderful adults.

## What are your favorite things to do outside of school?

I love spending time with my kids and my family. I love to travel and hope to see every continent someday. I especially enjoy learning about history and different cultures; immersing myself in them, art, music, architecture, customs and especially the food. I'm a very adventurous eater.

## Do you have any advice for students studying music now?

Be patient with the hard parts, and don't spend all your time on the easy parts.

Always remember you're doing what you love, and never forget to love what you do.

## **ELEMENTARY SCHOOL NOTES**

#### **GENERAL MUSIC**

Thank you, Friends of Music! The 1,900 K-5 students are receiving their music department kits in the beautiful red drawstring bags provided by you. This bag was essential to keep items safely separated and secured, but your logo is a great touch! Virtual Academy students can use them to participate at home. Students at school view and participate in their classrooms.

Now that Chromebooks are out, some teachers are having the older students watch the music lesson videos up close and personal. It is encouraging to see them chant along to a song, or stand up and move to a modified "Thriller" dance. K-3 are been goofing around dancing the "Winter Wiggles!" We are still learning rhythms, doing listening lessons, identifying what Mrs. Johnston is singing in ear training (do re mi), and doing actions to songs, such as "February" or "Oh Happy Day." We are getting free resources from Carnegie Hall Explorers and received funds from the Rosendale PTO to provide a year's subscription to the Singing Classroom.com that provides songs, games and activities as a safe alternative to singing and sharing instruments! Another new free resource, Music Workshop.com provided K-5 an enrichment video doing an overview of Rhythm & Blues music. They heard Little Richard say, "Rhythm and Blues had a baby, and they named it rock 'n roll." Soon Music Workshop will assist in teaching music of indigenous peoples in North America.

Those are just some of our Black History Month activities for February, though the music of black musicians is with us all throughout the year. March is the National Association for Music Education's Music In Our Schools Month! It is also Women's History month and March Madness. How does that all connect? Well, students will be completing a Music March Madness bracket about musicians and composers, by seeing which two they prefer per lesson, until there's a Final Four and a Winning Composer/Song. Clara Schumann, Barbara Strozzi, Carole King, and Dolly Parton may be represented for example. Kids are doing a song co-written by Carole King and Maurice Sendak. Carole King was the first woman to receive The Gershwin Prize, an award also won by songwriters such as Sir Paul McCartney.

## Music in Our Schools Month Virtual Symposium for Band Students

March is Music in Our Schools Month! Since the students will be missing out on our typical Proctors Festival this year, I wanted to take advantage of the virtual nature of our instruction and offer something special for Niskayuna Band Students. We called on some personal contacts to put together a "virtual symposium" for the students. We are very excited to present the following offering for the middle school band students.

7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Bands Wednesday, March 24<sup>th</sup> 9:00-9:30 - "Meet the Composer" with Mr. Brian Franco

7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Bands Thursday, March 25<sup>th</sup> 9:00-9:30 - "Meet the Composer" with Mr. Brian Franco

In these masterclasses, Mr. Franco will rehearse his band composition, "Stellar Engines" over Google Meet with all 7th and 8th Grade Band Students. The students will have a unique opportunity to see a piece of music through the lens of the composer. Mr. Franco will discuss his intent, how he tries to communicate his ideas through the score, what he hopes the band will do with his piece and how they can make it their own. Students will see that each piece of music has a real person behind the notes on the page, and learn how anyone can use the score to both preserve the composer's intent as well as create their own artistic interpretation as an ensemble.

Mr. Franco is the High School Band Director at Skaneateles School District, and an active composer and arranger. He is the founder of youscoremusic, a site that features downloadable, customizable music for young instrumental groups to address individual learning in an ensemble setting. #### CHORAL CORNER

We are excited to welcome several professors from *Westminster Choir College at Rider University* into our virtual classroom to celebrate Music in Our Schools Month (MIOSM®)!

March 2 - Professor Vinroy Brown will lead Choir in a lecture entitled "Antiracism in the Choral Classroom".

**March 11** – *Professor Jason Vodicka* will join **Concert Chorale** to share on the topic "Body Mapping: Body Alignment for Singing and Computing".

**March 19** – *Dr. Sharon Merchandani* will be visiting **Ladies First** to give a presentation called "*Women in American Music History*".

## **Project-Based Learning Presentations**

Bel Canto Voices and Studio Singers are in the process of giving a culminating presentation for their peers in conjunction with their project-based learning that they started back in September. Students in each class brainstormed a myriad of topics to research and created an outline of three benchmarks to help them progress towards a final product. After turning in the final product, students participated in a peer review where they emailed a classmate constructive feedback and praise. Some presentations include slideshows about composers, musical eras, jazz artists and specific musical styles such as the Renaissance, Bossa Nova or Claudio Monteverdi. Other students have turned pop songs into a madrigal composition using programs such as Finale, Note Flight, Garage Band and the Acapella App. Others created a themed Spotify playlist with cover art and liner notes or artist biographies. Finally, after the presentation, each student reviews a rubric and reflets on their presentation/performance. We have been blown away by the amazing presentations and unique and creative topics that students have delved into.

## **NYSSMA Solo Festival (Virtual)**

HS choral students are currently preparing for the NYSSMA Solo Festival. As this is a fully virtual festival, participants will be uploading their videos during the week of March 19. Students are studying works in English, Italian, and French to present to judges from all over the state. Those who are not studying privately have been attending one-on-one vocal coaching sessions with Mrs. Catalano via google meet. There will be an opportunity to sing for peers in their large ensemble classes for feedback and to help shake any nervousness in anticipation of the performance (likely virtually or in a prerecorded video).

#### **Ladies First Name Change**

During December Ladies First moved forward with a name change that will begin during the 2021-2022 school year. Students submitted suggestions and sophomore member Taryn Klein offered "A-Choired Taste" which was a great play on words! Nothing about the group's makeup will change; this class is still for treble voices (sopranos and altos), but the alteration in title was aimed at a more inclusive group that focused not on gender, but on the voice parts that comprise the ensemble.

## **Concert Chorale World Premiere Opportunity**

26 students in **Concert Chorale** (more than half the group!) have chosen to be part of the world premiere of Dr. Bradley Ellenbogen's composition *Hate Has No World* as sponsored by the stellar local choral ensemble Albany Pro Musica. Students learned the music in class and had accessed instructional videos provided by the composer in addition to asynchronous sectional rehearsals with APM education director and HS choral director Brendan Hoffman (Albany HS). Students uploaded videos that will be put together in a virtual chorus format for a world premiere on April 25. Students who have taken part in this exciting event should check their email about the virtual premiere party that will be happening in conjunction with this presentation!

## Changing the Paradigm: Exploring Women Composers



Natasha Farny, Professor of Cello, SUNY Fredonia School of Music

Natasha Farny is Professor of Cello at the State University of New York in Fredonia. Her current research interests include the study of music by women. She has given lectures on the music by women and with her cello and piano duo, Ekstasis, she has performed a program called "Women's Voices" throughout New York State. Future plans for "Women's Voices" include tours of the West Coast, a CD release in 2021, and a multimedia project that will include footage and live performance. Highlights for the year include the release of her debut CD, "French Cello Music," on the Centaur Label, a performance in NYC's Merkin Hall with the Ekstasis Duo, and a concerto performance with the Schenectady Symphony Orchestra. She is on faculty at the Sewanee Summer Music Festival, the Brancaleoni International Music Festival, and at the Fredonia String Camp.

In this masterclass, Dr. Socolof will discuss careers in Arts Management. Arts Management is a field that most high school students are unaware of, and an option for students who want to stay in the arts without necessarily being a teacher or practitioner. Arts Management is a broad field with something for every interest and skill set and is perfect for people with brave and enthusiastic minds and perspectives.


